Role of the Year Head Pádraig O'Reilly

Students

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My role can be split into three main areas:

- 1. Monitor and Support Academic Progress
- 2. Promote Student Wellbeing
- 3. Implement the school's Code of Behaviour

Role of the Year Head

1. Monitor and Support Academic Progress:

- Monitoring homework and classwork through journal checks and tutor report forms - Liaise with tutor
- Communicate with parents/guardians to discuss concerns raised through the tutor system or by class teachers.
- Recommend and support strategies and paths towards achieving goals.
- Refer students to the Guidance Department if necessary.
- Refer students to the AEN department for possible support.
- Hold assemblies to praise and encourage students in their efforts.

Role of the Year Head

2. Promote Student Wellbeing

- Liaise with others to ensure that our students are given every support possible.
- Communicate with parents/guardians, tutors and teachers.
- Engage with the anti-bullying team and assist them in enforcing the school's anti-bullying policy.
- Acknowledge students' achievements and encourage participation in extra-curricular activities.

Role of the Year Head

3. Implement the school's Code of Behaviour

- VSware checks daily to identify issues arising.
- Interview students regarding any issues that arise.
- Communicate with parents/guardians.
- Facilitate meetings with parents/guardians.
- Issue relevant sanctions.
- Refer to DP/Principal if necessary.
- Refer to pastoral care team if necessary.
- Meet with students to discuss behavioural challenges and devise a plan for moving forward.

Tutor System & VSware


- Parents Superistant
- Each class has a tutor that they meet with every Friday for 20 minutes.
- The role of the tutor is to:
 - Check in with the students in a pastoral care sense.
 - Monitor VSware and report any concerns/issues to the year head on an ongoing basis.
 - Review journals to confirm that they are signed by parents/guardians and that VSware is being checked weekly.
- You have access to view information on VSware and we encourage that you view this weekly as you will be able to monitor homework, equipment and other notes as they arise.







Exemptions From Irish

- All up to date information can be found in Department of education Circular 0055/2022-
- An exemption from the study of Irish may be allowed in the following circumstances
- A student moving from a different country without previous experience of learning the Irish language
- A student who experiences significant literacy difficulties which are an obstacle to their learning across the curriculum
- A student who experiences a high level of multiple and persistent needs that are a significant barrier to the student's participation and engagement in their learning and school life

Modern Language Requirement

A Modern language <u>is required</u> for the majority of courses at N.U.I . Colleges (i.e. UCD/ NUI Maynooth/ UCG/UCC)

For example :

- Arts
- Law / politics
- Commerce / Finance / Economics
- Health Sciences (Medicine / Dentistry / Pharmacy/ Veterinary etc)
- Human Sciences: (philosophy /psychology / philosophy etc)
- Social Science.
- Music / Drama/ Sports

A Modern Language <u>is not a specific requirement</u> for the following institutions. Instead Irish & English is accepted.

Implications for the Leaving Cert

Important:

Leaving Cert students continue with the 3 core subjects and select 4 option subjects.

It is very difficult to take up a new Subject Option at Senior Cycle if you haven't already studied it for three years at Junior Cycle.

Junior Fact Sheet Certificate





Civic, Social and Political Education (CSPE) is taught to all Junior Certificate students. It aims to help you to become actively involved in your community, your country and the wider world.

CSPE

What will I learn in CSPE?

- In CSPE class you will get a chance to think about questions such as:
- what does it mean to be an active citizen?
- how can I get involved in my community?
- how can I make a difference?
- what are human rights?

 how can I play a part in protecting the environment? But you will do more than just thinking about these things You will be taking action!

How will CSPE connect with the world outside of school?

CSPE is all about understanding our community, our society and the wider world; how each work and how we can make them better.

- Some of the things you may do are:
- take pact in an environmental project, such as recycling, in your local area
- organise a visit to a local court
- support a campaign for children's rights
- watch what's happening in the news
- discuss the topics that come up in class with
- your family and friends.

How will I learn CSPE in school?

Being active in the classroom is very important in CSPE. Some of the things you may do with your teacher and classmates are:

- work on your own, but also in
- pairs and in groups
 discuss and debate topics in class
- learn through games, role play, photos and other activities
- use newspapers, magazines, books and the Internet to find out information
- invite a guest speaker into the class or go on a trip outside of
- school. Some other things that will help you learn in class are:
- asking questions
- keeping a file of your notes and handouts as they will be useful for learning and for revision
- finding out how voting works by organising a mock election in your class.

What if I choose the wrong option?


Students may <u>only</u> change an subject option in the following circumstances:

Once it is within the first month – end of September

Availability: If there is space in the subject. For example, the Department stipulate a maximum of 24 students in Practical classes.

Legitimate reasons for changing: extreme difficulty in subject.

VSware and Options



Assessments for Incoming First Years

- The Cognitive Abilities Test (CAT4) is an assessment designed to measure students' core abilities in the four areas most linked to academic success in school:
- Verbal
- Quantitative
- Non-verbal
- Spatial

It identifies a pupil's strengths, weaknesses and learning preferences in the above.

Students also completed the *New Group Reading Test* (NRGT) - This enables the assessment of reading and comprehension in a single test, helping to identify, for instance, competent readers with weak comprehension skills .

- The main purpose of the assessments is to identify the students who need extra support.
- It is not used to stream classes but to ensure mixed ability groupings in First Year.



Starting in Secondary School

Working with Primary schools- Transfer Team meet with Primary School teachers.

We have shared sample timetables, map of school, information with regard to school day to help prepare students.

Start date in late August - Transition day for First Years only. Fifth Yr mentors here to help with first few days.

Getting the basics right at the start.

<u>Our school day</u>

- Classes start at 8:50 am- Monday to Thursday and 8:40 on Friday.
- Students should be in school at least 10 minutes before this. (lockers etc)
- Lunch Break at 11:50-12:50
- School day finishes at 3:50pm (monday-thursday)
- School finishes at 1:15pm on Friday



- Students must sign up if they want a locker- Notice regarding this will be sent to parents.
- Lockers can only be used before classes commence, lunchtime and at the end of the school day.

Book Rental Scheme

- All text books are available.
- Books mislaid or returned in a poor condition must be paid for.
- Workbooks can be purchased from the school.
- Information letter will be sent to parents in the coming weeks

- Parent Teacher Meetings
 1st year date = February 2024
- Notification will be sent prior to meeting- indicate preferences and given time to see various teachers.



- Very important your child attends everyday.
- Please notify us if student will be absent and contact us if you are concerned about attendance.
- Attendance Committee meet every week contact with home in the form of letters/visits etc.
- 20 days or more missed (in one year) must be reported to the Education Welfare Services.

WHEN A STUDENT NEEDS TO LEAVE

Please aim to have all appointments outside of school time.

Lost time in school is hard to catch up.

Your son/daughter needs to be signed out by yourself. This can be done at the attendance office. This office is just inside the main door on your left.



Please ensure the school have up to date medical information for your child, if you deem it appropriate for us to know.
